





Brother Rudyard Kipling



➤ Early Masonic Diversity: Brother Rudyard Kipling was born December 30, 1865 in Bombay, India, but was educated at the United Services College, North Devon, England. He returned to India in 1880 where he joined the editorial staff of the Civil and Military Gazette and Pioneer at Lahore, serving until 1889. He began writing verse and tales while in India, and continued after his return to England in 1889. His writing contained frequent Masonic references.

In 1886, he published his first volume of verse, and his first prose collection was published in January 1888, a month after his 22nd birthday. In early 1889, he returned to England by way of Japan, across the United States and Canada, and thence to Liverpool. His writings flourished, and in 1891 his health forced him to make another sea voyage; before his returned he proposed, via telegraph, to his wife-to-be. Following his marriage, they lived for a time in the United States in the state of Vermont. They returned to England in 1896, but continued to travel periodically. His writing continued unabated until the 1930s. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1907, being the youngest individual to receive it. He succumbed to a perforated duodenal ulcer in the Middlesex Hospital in London on January 18, 1936. Rudyard Kipling is pictured on a stamp issued by Sweden on December 9, 1967, to honor the 1907 Nobel Prize winners.

Brother Kipling was initiated in Hope and Perseverance Lodge No. 872, Punjab, India, in 1886 by a special dispensation, because he was only 20 years and six months old. He recorded his own raising in the minutes, as he was immediately elected secretary of the Lodge. In an article which appeared in "The Freemason" (London) in 1925, he wrote "I was secretary for some years of Hope and Perseverance No. 782, E.C., Lahore, which included Brethren of at least four creeds. I was entered by a member of Brahmo Somaj, a Hindu; passed by a Mohammedan; and raised by an Englishman. Our Tyler was an Indian Jew. We met, of course, on the level, and the only difference anyone would notice was that at our banquets, some of the Brethren, who were debarred by caste rules from eating food not ceremonially prepared, sat over empty plates."

He received his Mark Master degree in the Mark Lodge "Fidelity" on April 12, 1887, and Royal Ark Mariners degree in the Lodge "Mt. Ararat" at Lahore, on April 17, 1888. He affiliated with the Independence and Philanthropy Lodge No. 391, Allahabad, Bengal in 1888. On his return to England, he became a founder of the Lodge Builders of the Silent Cities No. 4848 in 1927, and of Author's Lodge No. 3456. He was also appointed poet laureate of the Canongate Kilwinning Lodge No. 2 of Edinburgh, Scotland.

CIVILITY

An Excerpt from Right Worshipful David B. Dibrell, Past Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas in 2001

An excerpt from a speech by the late great Right Worshipful **David B. Dibrell** at the Scottish Rite honors day in 2015, who had personally given me (James Kirkpatrick) permission (before he passed away) to use his material as appropriate.

... I suggest that we focus our attention on "Civility" which we could define as basic dignity and respect. Our core Masonic values are life, liberty, equality, justice, truth, pursuit of happiness, popular sovereignty, separation of powers, rule of law, sanctity of family, and so on. We assume the simple, non-aggression principle of civility. Yet, I believe, and I think each of you will agree, that we have very serious problems in the World and in Society today as seemingly everyone is becoming increasingly un-civil, unkind, rude, disrespectful, and even unlawful. Hostile speech permeates the news. Uncivil behavior has become an epidemic. The World seems to be dominated by factions that are rude, confrontational and hostile. Religious intolerance and bigotry fractures the World today, even in our own cities and neighborhoods. We need what I call, "A Return to Civility", a return to kindness, consideration and love!

... As Masons we need to focus on a return to kindness, a return to consideration, "A Return to Civility" and help guide all those around us to those principles that will influence a return to greater respect, a greater attitude of a life of civility. The World is politically divided and antagonistic; however, Masons are taught to be good citizens and respectful of the opinions of others. The World may be fractured by religious intolerance and bigotry; but, in Masonry, we are taught to respect all religions and welcome all believers in The Great Architect of the Universe - in whatever form that belief may take.

So, it is apparent that society hungers for a return to civility. I ask you this question - If we, as Masons, have the common language, the tools, the values and the desire to create a better world, isn't it our duty to do all that we can to breed civility back into society? Aren't we uniquely positioned to tackle this problem?

When we first crossed the threshold into our Lodge as an Entered Apprentice, our brothers impressed upon us the importance of learning to subdue our passions, and keeping our desires within due bounds toward all mankind. While it is perfectly acceptable, and even encouraged, that we debate policies where we have disagreement, we must always respect the individuals and the opinions they hold.

Thomas Jefferson often disagreed with George Washington on policy matters but they always remained friends. Jefferson once said to William Hamilton, "I never consider a difference of opinion in politics, in religion or in philosophy, as cause for withdrawing from a friend."

And we can go further, my brothers. The need for safe and open dialogue about difficult and complex subjects has certainly not diminished. There just seems to be fewer places and opportunities for this to occur. We need to communicate in more than sound bites and we need to return to real, face-to-face conversations; and we, as Masons, can provide the forums to do just that.

Masons can also serve as catalysts for change and be facilitators of civil dialogue. We are well skilled and aptly qualified to teach those in our midst the means of treating each other with dignity and respect. And perhaps most importantly, we can be instrumental in this effort because we have what I refer to as a perfect and unique "delivery system" to promote civil dialogue.

... Freemasonry provides the opportunity for ordinary men, who hold a shared set of morals and values, to do extraordinary things. And each of us has been honored with this very special opportunity. Those of you that are honored today have a special opportunity and challenge. More is now expected from you than ever before. This is a time of honor as well as a time of renewal. We must not let our brethren down. We cannot let society down.

... I therefore ask you, my brethren, if not us, then who? And if not now, then when? I shudder to even consider the consequences of our inaction. America can have the courage to incorporate our Masonic tools and enlightenment to help to repair our world. Do we have the fortitude to take full advantage of this opportunity, to breed civility back into our society, and into our own communities, which are so desperately in need of our leadership? We can demonstrate our relevance in our communities. We can say, with conviction that, due to our efforts, our world is a better place. And then my brethren, harmony will forever prevail!

George Washington was a perfect example of civility, of living in a loving and respectful manner. At age sixteen, George Washington copied by hand "110 Rules of Civility & Decent Behavior in Company and Conversation". These rules were originally

written by French Jesuits in 1595. He may have copied these only as an exercise in penmanship, but these rules of decency and politeness permeated Washington's life and should also permeate ours.

Here are a few of those rules for your consideration:

- 1. Pay attention listen to what others say.
- 2. Acknowledge others and respect their right to disagree.
- 3. Treat everyone with respect.
- 4. Be considerate of others. Do not embarrass others.
- 5. Accept and give praise.
- 6. Don't draw attention to yourself.
- 7. When a person does their best and fails, do not criticize them.
- 8. Do not make fun of anything important to others.
- 9. Apologize earnestly and sincerely.
- 10. When you speak, be concise. (James Kirkpatrick is really trying, ok)
- 11. Associate with good people. It is better to be alone than be in bad company.
- 12. A person should not overly value their own accomplishments.
- 13. Assert yourself
- 14. Avoid personal questions
- 15. Accept and give constructive criticism

These are only fifteen. I'll let you look up and read the other 95.

... How can we make a positive difference? One very simple way to make a difference is for each of us to become better leaders. We must be leaders in our Lodges, we must take that giant step forward to become, if we are not already, leaders in our churches, in our schools and in our communities.

... As the poet has said:

You are writing a Gospel, a chapter each day,

By deeds that you do, and by words that you say.

Men will read what you have written, whether faulty or true.

Ask yourself every day, what is the Masonic Gospel, according to YOU?

May we always ask ourselves:

"What Would George Washington Do?"

I believe that George Washington would be kind, considerate, respectful, loving and civil.

Now, more importantly, ask ourselves:

"What Would A True and Dedicated Mason Do?" "What are YOU going to Do?"

Fred E. Allen, PGM



Right Worshipful Fred E. Allen passed away.

We have incorporated a tribute to him, as published on the Grand Lodge of Texas website.

When you first meet **Fred Allen**, you do not immediately get the impression of a highly successful salesman.

Quiet, dignified and unassuming – almost shy – Fred Allen's ability to convince – to sell – becomes more and more apparent as you are exposed to his sincerity and obvious dedication to his purpose.

For, without question, he has proven his sales ability. After graduation from East Texas University at Commerce, he taught school in Ennis for three years before entering the Army. After returning from military service in Germany, he decided to try his hand at selling, and rose quickly to Sales and Advertising Manager for Robotyper Corporation in 1954. Five years later, he joined the parent organization, Royal Typewriter Company, as Western Regional Sales Manager, Chicago, and just one short year later moved to New York City as National Sales Manager. In 1963 he stepped up to become Sales Manager for Litton Industries Business Equipment Group.

Striking out on his own, he founded his own company in 1966, but in 1972, he tired of New York state and returned to Texas to operate the family ranch near Mt. Pleasant. But the sales instinct was too strong, and he soon founded his present highly successful direct mail management business, with a nationwide clientele. He was elected Charter President of the Mailing List Industry Association in New York City, and was the keynote speaker at the International Direct Marketing Symposium in Montreux, Switzerland. He's been listed in South and Southwest Who's Who since 1978.

While teaching in Ennis, he decided to follow his father into Masonry, and was raised in Ennis Lodge 369 on February 28, 1950. During his sojourn in New York, his work prevented him from being active, but upon his return to his birthplace in Titus County in 1972, he affiliated with Temple Lodge 70 at Mount Pleasant, and served as Master of the Lodge in 1978-79. Later, he served as District Deputy Grand Master in 1983, and in 1987, doubled as Grand Marshal and State Coordinator. He is also a Charter member of both Roy Stanley Lodge 1367 and Claud L. Austin Daylight Lodge 1450, both in Dallas, and is still a member of his mother lodge, Ennis 369. He is an Endowed Member of all four lodges.

He has been a member of all York Rite Bodies since 1950, serving as Thrice Illustrious Master of Rob Morris Council 31 in 82-83; and as High Priest of Rob Morris Chapter 40 in 1981-82. He served as District Deputy Grand High Priest in 1981-82, and District Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council in 1983-84. In the Knights Templar, he served as Generalissimo of Pittsburg Commandery in 1987.

Active in Scottish Rite since 1978, he now serves as Membership Chairman for the Valley of Dallas, the largest Scottish Rite Valley in the Southern Jurisdiction. He was invested with the Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 1983, and was coroneted a Thirty-third Degree Inspector General Honorary in 1987.

A noble of the Mystic Shrine, he belongs to Hella Shrine Temple, and is a Past President of the Knights of Mecca, the Temple's Blue Lodge Degree Team. Other Masonic and Masonic-affiliated memberships include the Order of High Priesthood; Order of the Silver Trowel; York Rite College; Red Cross of Constantine; Royal Order of Scotland; Philalethes Society; the Texas Lodge of Research; Texas College, Masonic Rosicrucians; and the Order of Eastern Star.

To Fred Allen, public and community relations are absolutely vital to the success and growth of Freemasonry at the grassroots. He practices what he preaches.

He is past Chairman of the Foundation Board of East Texas University and was honored by the University as a Distinguished Alumnus in 1985. He is past President of the East Texas Angus Association and a past member of the Board of the Texas Angus Association. He has served as a member of the Board of Titus County Hospital District, and of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce. Additionally, for a number of years he served as a member and Chairman of the Board of the American National Bank of Mount Pleasant. In Masonry, he was one of the principal architects of the highly successful Sesquicentennial Celebration of the Grand Lodge of Texas. A large share of the very positive public impact of the 150th birthday of Texas Masonry was a result of his outstanding efforts.

He strongly believes that every Mason should support the church or synagogue of his choice. He is a very active member of Tennison United Methodist Church of Mount Pleasant, where he was a Lay Delegate to the Annual Conference from 1978 to 1989. He as served as President of the Methodist Men twice, has ushered and served in many other tasks in the Church.

He has been very happily married to the former Mildred Craghead for over 35 years. Their daughter, Linda, is the wife of Lee Miche, a young and active Mason and East Texas businessman.
