

# 2022 Grand Oration Christopher Livingston

Service and Truth.

We are assembled today in the auditorium of this Grand Building that serves as a memorial to our Brethren who answered the call of God and Country to serve and sacrifice for freedom and liberty and the American way of life. We dedicated this building to their sacrifice some 8 years after the date our Brother Franklin Roosevelt declared as a day that would live in infamy. We too often forget that this Building—this Temple—is dedicated to our departed brothers.

This Building is not only a flame burning in remembrance; it is our northern star lighting our way as a repository of knowledge. A guide to Truth. A library and museum comprising artifacts and tomes to light our way down the rough and rugged road of life.

Service and Truth.

I am reminded on this occasion of an apocryphal story about Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson on a camping trip. After dinner and a bottle of wine, they lay down for the night, and go to sleep.

Some hours later, Holmes wakes and nudges his faithful friend.

"Watson, look up and tell me what you see."

Watson replied, "I see millions of stars."

"What does that tell you?" Watson ponders for a minute.

"Astronomically, it tells me that there are millions of galaxies and potentially billions of planets."

"Astrologically, I observe that Venus is in Aquarius."

"Horologically, I deduce that the time is approximately a quarter past three."

"Theologically, I can see that God is all powerful and that we are small and insignificant."

"Meteorologically, I suspect that we will have a beautiful day tomorrow."

"What does it tell you, Holmes?"

Holmes was silent for a minute, then spoke: "Watson, you idiot. Someone has stolen our tent!" \*\*\*

Sometimes we get so obsessed with our own lives that we miss the obvious. But I pose a question for Sherlock Holmes. Has our tent been stolen or did the wind just blow it off stakes? What is the Truth? I was speaking with a 50-year Mason the other day, Larry. Larry was raised just after his lodge was chartered. He met the brother that brought him into his lodge over coffee at work. This brother would deliver goods to where Larry was working and they would strike up a conversation and get to know one another. Then one day Larry asked this brother about the Masonic ring he was wearing. One thing led to another and Larry became a Mason. A good Mason. But that was then, this is now.

It's 2023. The largest taxi service in the world is Uber. It doesn't own a single vehicle. The largest hotel service in the world is Airbnb. It doesn't own a single property. The biggest retailer? Amazon which has no storefronts but is estimated to reach \$729 billion in retail ecommerce sales worldwide in 2023. Your average petitioner found out about Masonry on the internet. He didn't meet a brother over coffee. Nobody in lodge knew him before he walked in the door.

It's 2023. Men are wandering in a world that tells them to seek immediate gratification. Take the easy road and think about yourself. They are learning about Freemasonry from podcasts, Facebook, Twitter, and TikTok; social media that didn't exist even fifteen years ago.

Now, if the inquirer went to some good sites—not the illuminationes—and learned about some philosophy or history of Freemasonry, he might be impressed by our Order and want to join. One of the ideas that has become popular and made its rounds on Midnight Freemasons, the Laudable Pursuit, and Living Stones Magazine (these are real things, my brothers) comes from the 1949 book The Hero with a Thousand Faces by Professor Joseph Campbell.

1949, incidentally, is the same year we dedicated this Memorial Temple.

Professor Campbell studied myths, ritual, and legends in cultures across the world and came up with this basic formula that he called the hero's journey or monomyth. It's been the basis of several films you've seen such as Star Wars and The Matrix. Some Masons have applied this to our three degrees and especially to this legend of Hiram Abiff. The application can make sense, but I think some of our brethren miss the tent so to speak.

Professor Campbell's hero's journey contained three main parts: (1) A Departure; (2) An Initiation; and (3) A Return. Now, he further breaks this down into seventeen subparts and I'm not going to go into those. It's not my point. I want to talk about the hero, Hiram Abiff. Here's where I think our brethren sometimes get it wrong—they get caught up in the stars.

The managing editor of Midnight Freemasons says the Hero's Journey means, "Think of Luke destroying the Death Star or Neo becoming the One. I think this is pretty self-explanatory to those who have gone through the third degree." Two things I want to point out about Hiram Abiff when we think about who our brothers are calling the Masonic Hero here.

First, TikTok has this thing called "Main Character Syndrome." It's a description of narcissistic behavior—the world revolves around you. Hiram Abiff is not Luke Skywalker or Neo. He's not even the main character in the building of King Solomon's Temple. In fact, he's not even the Secondary Character. He's the tertiary character, right. King Solomon, King Hiram of Tyre, and Hiram Abiff—a craftsman. The craftsman is our hero. The humble craftsman, and not either of the powerful monarches, is our hero. The humble craftsman is the object of emulation in our Masonic.

the powerful monarchs, is our hero. The humble craftsman is the object of emulation in our Masonic journey.

I was an Eagle Scout and one summer I worked at Camp Three Falls for the Summer. Troop 307, the Screaming Eagles! We had an adult volunteer, probably in his early 70s, who managed the woodworking merit badge station. Tall guy. Big. Probably played tight end in college. His son got in a car wreck that Summer and wound up in a coma, but Glen kept coming to volunteer. He led his life by this philosophy: God is first, Others are Second, and I am Third. He's my hero. I see Hiram Abiff in Glen. He's the third chair guy. He gives it all up for the team.

Some of you may remember those bracelets they were selling a couple years ago. "I am Second." Freemasonry's message is "I am Third." We are taught that from the very beginning. The Master charges us on our night of initiation that "There are three great duties which, as a Mason, you are charged to inculcate: to God, your neighbor, and yourself." Our Order gives you the order right up front. From the beginning we are taught God is first, Others are Second, and I am Third.

I remember my mentor, David Dibrell, who taught me that the most important thing in Masonry was helping a brother up—mentoring your fellow brother. David would send you these handwritten cards out of the blue or whisper a kind word in your ear when you were feeling down. It's about lifting your brothers up. Especially when they are down or have made a mistake. Not just a mistake in ritual, but mistakes in life because even good brothers make mistakes in life. But Freemasonry is a bond that transcends the bounds of the lodgeroom, the state, and our country. It is a brotherhood for life and we need to remember that and assist our fallen brothers in the most tender manner like it says in Monitor. As it states in the Master Mason Handbook, "Master Masons must always practice Brotherly Love. If your brother should slip, offer your hand to him without judgement or harsh criticism, and remember that if tempted in the same way, you yourself may have fallen." We need to elect more David Dibrells to this Grand Lodge. My brethren, Freemasonry is not about me. I am a Third. So give it up for kids through Shriners and Scottish Rite. Give it up for your brothers. Give it up. And it's not about you and you aren't Luke or Neo. You're supposed to be Hiram. It's about Service.

Second, Hiram Abiff stands for the fact that there are absolute truths in life. The 47th Proposition of Euclid, also known as the Pythagorean Theorem, is one of the nine symbols of the Master Mason's degree. It demonstrates that an absolute truth can be established: a + b = c. The square can be proven.

Compare this with our modern, American relativism. Our petitioners are living in a world where everyone's truth is subjective. They are told everyone is entitled to have their own beliefs, and that those beliefs are equally valid. They are told there is no such thing as truth. My truth might be different from your truth because of my experiences. The tolerant person takes the neutral ground. Isn't this what we hear today in society?

What is lost on the advocates of relativism is that they actually take a position. They claim there is no such thing as absolute truth. They say if I tell you two plus two equals five, I'm entitled to that belief. These advocates say pointing out that the correct answer is four is intolerant. Balderdash! In 1856, our Grand Orator, P.W. Gray, speaking in the Baptist Church before the Craft resumed their labors in this Grand body remarked that Freemasonry's "foundation-stone is truth; its strength is the cement of brotherly love and harmony and its beauty, universal benevolence, relief and charity. In the dim obscurity of antiquity, we see the light of these virtues;" ... and although neither "wreck nor vestige of [King Solomon's Temple] can now be found... No such fate has befallen the moral Temple of Freemasonry. Founded on the imperishable principle of truth, it was destined to endure and preserve its proportions unimpaired."

Our hero is a protector of truth. A truth in the Fatherhood of God, the Brotherhood of Man, and the Immortality of the Soul. We hear those absolute truths questioned today in our society, but not in our Freemasonry. Not by our heroes. Not by our Brothers who gave their lives to God and Country in World War II.

We stake our tents in this solid ground—Service and Truth. We stake our tents in this solid ground and dare the world to come.

I've talked about what we did in 74 years ago and what we did 167 years ago. Let's go back a little further. Much time has passed since George Washington served as Master of Alexandria Lodge No. 22 in Virginia. His spirit continues to look over us and every regular Texas lodge where his portrait hangs. At the first Presidential Inauguration, as George Washington was about to take the oath of office, he paused. Something was amiss. Chancellor Robert Livingston, who was to administer the oath of office agreed. Livingston, who was also the Grand Master of New York, called on the Master of St. John's Lodge to fetch a Bible. The inauguration proceeded in proper form and President Washington after taking the oath, said "so help me God" and kissed the open Bible. Washington and Livingston realized the truth that such a laudable undertaking could not begin without the aid of deity.

#### Service and Truth.

The years change and accumulate, but the themes of Freemasonry today Washington would know. For we are not this story's author—an author who fills time and eternity with His purpose. And His purpose is achieved in our duty: to God, to our Neighbors, and, then, to ourselves.

Never tiring, never yielding, never finishing, we renew that purpose today: to make our Lodges better; to make Grand Lodge better, to make Freemasonry better, to make Texas better; to make America better.

We accomplish that task by remembering our values, remembering our hero. Just like our forefathers, we have to stake ourselves in the firm foundation of the principles of Freemasonry. Our work continues. The story goes on. And the angels still ride in our whirlwind of life, while God directs us through the storm.

Service and Truth my brethren. Ingrain in your daily life that God is first, others are second, and I am third. Search for the Truth in this ever increasingly complex and confusing digital world. Sometimes we have to peek around the canvas of the tent, sometimes we have to set the tent aside to gaze at the stars, but the message is always the same—be Hiram!


